Summer Reading Club

Held during December through to February each year by most public libraries, the Summer Reading Club offers holiday activities for children aged five years and older and their families over the holiday break.

The Summer Reading Club includes promotional posters, reading records, puzzles, activities, reading incentives, a website and a library manual - everything a library needs to run the program.

Why hold a summer reading club?

- Summer reading helps students return to school in the new year ready to learn and with greater reading fluency, vocabulary, and comprehension.
- The materials are ready to use and the program is flexible to allow it to be tailored to your library environment and your clients.
- Holiday activities can be incorporated as part of the club at your library.
- •Maintain or even increase library use by children and their families over the summer break.
- Create excitement in children about reading for leisure;
- By combining reading and other activities dispel the myth that libraries are boring places and that reading is only ever done alone.
- Provide reading support to families through booklists, and sharing your knowledge and expertise.



Library and Information Week which is held in May each year promotes the free flow of information and facilitating all Australians' access to recorded knowledge, information, and creative works.




As well as the National Simultaneous Storytime held during that same week, ALIA also supports a National Library Technicians' Day that celebrates the achievements of technicians everywhere!




